Course Description: The Common CORE Standards for seventh grade seminar students focuses on reading and understanding literature with an analytical mind. They will analyze how structure, point of view, visual elements, and figurative language contribute to the meaning or tone of texts. They will compare and contrast fictional and historical accounts, integrate information from several sources (synthesis), create their own opinion, and support that opinion with evidence from the text. Students write a variety of pieces, creating organized, clear, and creative arguments to support claims. When writing research projects, students collect additional questions for further research. They will work toward mastering the use of language conventions: form, grammar, punctuation, and word usage. They will use eye contact, appropriate volume, and clear pronunciation to speak with authority when presenting. For more information, refer to www.corestandards.org.

GATE (gifted and talented education) Seminar: In San Diego Unified School District, the Seminar Program is complex and faster paced than a typical classroom. Focus is on developing gifted potential, using techniques such as tiered assignments, curriculum compacting, acceleration, problem-based learning, and Socratic Seminars. In this model, there are generally no wrong answers or wrong ideas; students learn to stand behind their ideas with evidence from experience, text, professionals, research, and other methods. Seminar students show evidence of high achievement capability in intelligence, creativity, art, and leadership, yet they need services to fully develop those capabilities. One of the goals of secondary schools' seminar classes is to couple students' intelligence with social skills, moral thought, and academic stamina.
